

One day in Alberta newspapers



ALBERTA

- Highest reported rate of spousal assault
- Second highest rate of spousal homicide
- Highest rate of criminal harassment victimization/stalking
- 58% of those stalked by a current or former spouse, also reported being the victim of spousal violence
- 62% were abused by spouses
- 2005 112 homicides
 - 45 family related
 - RCMP 31 of 49 homicides

ABORIGINAL

Aboriginal women:

- significantly more likely to experience spousal assault (24%)
- -more severe forms of violence
- have a much higher rate of spousal homicide
- As many as 80 per cent of Aboriginal women have been abused by a partner.



- 21% of women abused by a partner were assaulted during pregnancy
- 40% reporting that the abuse <u>began</u> during pregnancy


CANADA

 Increased cost for violence against women: - social - health, and - criminal justice **Over \$4 billion annually**

Statistics in Canada

2003 Homicides:

- 139 family-related homicides (84 gang related murders)
- 89 intimate partners
- 35 murder-suicide
- 1,056 homicides 1991-2000, 80% women

FIELD ASSESSMENT SCREENING TOOL (FAST)

Instructions: Obtain information within first 12 hours of investigation from CPIC, Complainant, Witness, etc. Use the "Officer's Notes" for preparing police report. *** INFORMATION REQUIRED FOR BAIL HEARING

RELATIONSHIP: YES NO Officer's Notes 1. Current status of relationship: Is there past, recent or pending separation in the relationship? ***Bail 2. Previous Domestic Violence History: YES NO Is there a history of violence or abusive behaviour in the relationship? YES Escalation in Abuse: NO Is there escalation in the frequency/intensity of violence or abuse towards the complainant, family members or another person? 4. Child Abuse: YES NO Children's Services Notified? YES INO Are there children under 18 in the family who are abused or have been exposed to abuse? YES ***Bail COMPLAINANT: NO 5. Complainant's Perception of Personal Safety: Does the complainant believe the suspect will disobey terms of release (eg. no contact orders)? ***Bail YES Complainant's Perception of Future Violence: NO Does the complainant fear further violence if the suspect should be released from custody? YES ***Bail SUSPECT HISTORY: NO 7. Suspect's Criminal Violence History: Does the suspect have a history of charges or convictions for violence and/or sex assaults? ***Bail 8. Alcohol/Drugs: YES NO Does the suspect have a history of drug or alcohol abuse? YES NO 9. Threats: Has the suspect ever threatened to kill or harm the complainant, family member or another person? YES 10. Weapons: NO Has the suspect used or threatened to use a weapon against the complainant, family member or an animal, or does the suspect have access to weapons? 11. Court Orders: YES NO Has the suspect ever violated a court order? 12. Employment Instability: YES NO Is the suspect unemployed or experiencing financial problems? 13. Forced Sex: YES NO Has the suspect ever forced sex on the complainant? YES ***Bail 14. Mental Illness: NO Does the suspect have a history of mental illness (eq. depression or paranoia)? ***Bail 15. Suicidal Ideations: YES NO Has the suspect threatened or attempted suicide? YES NO 16. Strangling or Choking: Has the suspect ever strangled or choked the complainant? 17. Stalking: YES NO Has the suspect displayed jealous behaviours, stalked or harassed the complainant? 18. Other Information: YES NO Any other relevant information (eq. is the complainant socially/ physically isolated: unwilling to leave the home: cultural barriers inhibit complainant?)



Domestic Violence Death Review Committee: Case Reviews of Domestic Violence Deaths, 2002 – Ontario

Risk Factors for Homicide:

- History of domestic violence
- Separation
- Escalation
- Threats to kill victim
- Threats with a weapon
- Threats/attempts suicide
- Obsessive behaviour (stalking)
- Access to firearms
- Excessive alcohol/drug use
- Depression (mental health)
- Isolation of Victim
- Forced sexual acts or assaults during sex
- Child custody or access dispute

- New partner in victim's life
- Perpetrator unemployed
- Presence of stepchildren in home
- Common-law relationship
- Hostage-taking
- Destruction of victim's property
- Violence against family pets
- Extreme minimization or denial of spousal assault history
- Controls victim's daily activities
- Assaulted victim while pregnant
- Chokes victim
- Youth of couple
- Witnessed domestic violence as child

Meet in High School

- Invited to gathering
- Paints Portrait

Spring 1984
Knocking on door, waiting

Walking in, uninvited

→ Summer 1984 Afternoon nap \rightarrow 1984 - 1985 Rumors of intimate relationship Surveillance of activities Summer 1986 - Victim moves to Greece -> Fall 1986 - Pens lengthy letter (MAILED 86-11-07) "I'm living to see you..."

→ Fall 1986

Phoning and asking around January 1987

- Buys one-way ticket to Greece
- Taxi (\$300. For 500 km.)
- Phone calls & knows address
- Arrives at door (embrace, proposal)
- Follows onto airplane
- Arrival at home, calls begin

Phone calls of congratulations

→ March 1987 - Telegram to parent's house "Coming to Edmonton to see his girl ... " → April 1987 - At house with suitcase Police attend and carry off Spring 1987 - Telling people that married Spends night in graveyard Phoning parent's house Calls victim at her apartment (police) Temporary R.O. obtained Attends apartment, victim away

Breach – Court – "No Contact"


→ Summer 1987

Attends at house, w. beer


November 1987 — Five page love letter "The things you say to me in my head are wonderful and give me happiness I never dreamed possible..."

-> Christmas 1987 -- Gifts at parent's house (Black Candles, Othello, Witch story)

Simon's obsession, Katherine's ordeal



→ May 1988 Love letter from Ontario → June 1988 Moves back to Edmonton →Summer 1988 - Shows up at apartment, w. gift → August 1988 Card left at parent's house "Dear Katherine, Happy 6th Wedding Anniversary... Love Simon" Christmas 1988 - Attends at parents with gifts, inc. baby - Police attend and take away



July 20, 2001 Arrest & Investigation


Interview: "says wife and family"

- > AHC card: "Katherine E. Gagnon"
- Christmas gifts every year, since 1987
- Frequent surveillance observed by parents and neighbors
- > 12 hours in presence of victim

August 2001

- Search Warrant Executed
- Photos of Katherine on walls
- 20 Binders of writings seized

EROTOMANIC STALKER

- □ BELIEVES (FALSELY) THEY ARE "LOVED" BY THE VICTIM
- □ OBJECT OF AFFECTION IS USUALLY OF HIGHER STATUS
- □ CAN BE A STRANGER
- □ RESOURCEFUL, MULTIPLE CONTACT BEHAVIOURS
- □ MOST OFTEN FEMALE SUSPECT
- DELUSIONAL DISORDER (DSM IV) (IDEALIZED ROMANTIC LOVE & SPIRITUAL UNION)
- □ NOT INCLINED TO HURT VICTIM
- THIRD PARTY INDIVIDUALS MORE AT RISK (EG. WIFE, NEW GIRLFRIEND – VIEWED AS OBSTACLES)


Simon Gagnon – Katherine Whitbread September 1988 to July 2001

(VICTIM IMPACT)

"His behaviour didn't just make me afraid of him... What it really did was make me afraid of everything... It made me afraid of the police, it made me afraid of my parents, it made me afraid of myself... It made me believe that the world was a crappy, shitty place where no one would help you, no matter how good of person you are... If some loser wanted to kill you, steal your child, ruin your life, he could go right ahead, that was fine with everybody... It made me believe that all my dreams were impossible..."

Alberta Relationship Threat Assessment and Management Initiative (ARTAMI)

ARTAMI Regionalized Model



The Multi-Agency Team would consist of: 1 Provincial Program Director; 4 RCMP Officers (1 Aboriginal); 4 Municipal Police Officers in each of the Calgary, Edmonton, Lethbridge Regional and Medicine Hat Police Services; 2 Social Workers; 1 Crown Prosecutor; Psychologist, Psychiatrist); 2 positions dedicated to supporting safety to clients at highest risk; and 1 Administrative Support Staff.

- Coordination of Domestic Violence Protocols;
- Safety Planning for Victims;
- Mitigation Strategies;
